A NOTE FROM ALEX

In August 2018 I officially became the new Director of Breakthrough San Juan Capistrano. I was nervous to step into the role where I was preceded by several incredible leaders who, over 13 years, took a program serving 22 middle school students and expanded the scope and size of the program. Today, we serve 280 students from 7th grade through college and cover a breadth of programming to support a student's journey to become the first in their family to graduate college. I learned quickly that I wasn't stepping into the Director position alone. During my first year an entire community guided, mentored and supported me to continue advancing our vision— to break the cycle of poverty and transform the lives of young people through the power of education.

This experience highlighted the very core of Breakthrough- that people make Breakthrough. WE all influence the transformation that transpires. In our 13th year, we continue to actualize that vision and impact.

Every year we strive to meet new milestones and this year we was no different. Highlights include:

- Highest number of new student applications (80) and acceptances (50).
- Largest single student cohort: an incoming class of high school freshmen (50).
- Highest number of community and student volunteers (280) who gave approximately 4,000 hours of their time and talent to advance our vision.
- Most students served in one year (230) and during the summer program (134).
- First year supporting our college students through a year of college.
- Highest percentage of Breakthrough college students who served as summer teaching fellows (37%)



THIS YEAR: MIDDLE SCHOOL

Spotlight: Matias Oliveras

Matias was one of the 80 students who applied to join Breakthrough last fall. After submitting a 30 page application, attending an interview, turning in transcripts and teacher recommendation forms- he became 1 of the 50 new students admitted to the program. He made a commitment to the journey of becoming the first in his family to graduate college. In his speech at the end of summer celebration, he shared that, "my parents did not have an opportunity like this one. My parents were poor and did not have the money to go to college and start a career. My family gave me a better opportunity to be in a program like Breakthrough and have U.S. schooling by travelling all the way from Mexico and Peru. I feel lucky that I am in this program because it will help me succeed in school and it will make my family proud." During the first weeks of the summer program he expressed how challenging it was- getting out of his comfort zone to do cheers, play games and more. But, he took on the challenge. Taking risks to learn and grow. It culminated in his giving the 7th grade student speech to over 400 students and families at our end of summer celebration! He illustrates what many students experience in the summer program.


THIS YEAR: 2017 FIVE-YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN







INSTITUTIONAL SUSTAINABLITY

Breakthrough San Juan Capistrano students benefit directly from the generosity of those who support the program. Approximately 55 percent of Breakthrough SJC's budget is supported by gifts and grants from individuals, businesses and foundations, while the remainder of the program's operating expenses, overhead and salaries are supported by St. Margaret's Episcopal School.
